


ADMINISTRATIVE OFFICES RENOVATION 5TH & 6TH FLOORS

Plans and specifications are currently in progress for the administrative offices' renovation. They include layout changes, new flooring, ceilings, lighting, electrical, painting, collaboration spaces, designated storage, pantries, and new furnishings.



CAFETERIA RENOVATION

The Cafeteria will be outfitted with new equipment and modern finishes, new energy-efficient lighting, an acoustical tile ceiling, and new flooring. The demolition phase of the project is complete, and the general construction phase is ongoing.

classroom space, and Learning
Communities in an open space are all part of
the design scope. The area will serve
Computer Science, Architecture, Civil
Engineering, Math, Physics, and other

ENERGY SAVINGS PLAN PHASE II


The new LED lighting fixture retrofits include some remaining hallways and offices, Enrollment Services, staircases, Blue Area, Green Area, Red Area, Training Inc, the Clara Dasher building, and the Child Development Center. March and April 2023 are the target months.



ENTRANCE DOORS Phase II

Seven main door entrances were renovated, including new hardware, doors, frames, wireless door opening, and a new vestibule floor.

The project's second phase will include access control and card readers.



HVAC VENTILATION IMPROVEMENT

The systems upgrade includes new air handling units, ductwork, and new electrical panels to improve the air quality and circulation throughout the College structures ventilation system.

LIBRARY RENOVATION

The project includes a significant layout change with specialty and flexible spaces, new carpeting and flooring, lighting, painting, innovative furnishings, acoustic zones, learning communities, individual study areas, new security detection, and the relocation of the Learning Center.







PARKING GATE UPGRADE

Phase I - Upgrade to parking lots A and B gates will provide the College with added security. With the new system's ID cards, Public Safety can find out who has used their ID card to access the parking lot.

Phase II - Includes one ID allowing access to the parking lots, main entrances, and designated office space.





PEB LOCKER ROOM RENOVATION

The modernization of the area includes new finishes, lighting, electrical, and plumbing in the students' locker rooms and showers, acoustic ceilings, new flooring, and new display cases.

WEST ESSEX CAMPUS NEW ACADEMIC BUILDING

Construction of the new state-of-theart two-floor building is scheduled for completion in June 2023.



WEST ESSEX CAMPUS NEW PARKING DECK STRUCTURE

The new parking structure with approximately 350 parking spaces and connecting pedestrian bridge to the academic building is scheduled for completion in June 2023.



WEST ESSEX CAMPUS NEW SOCCER FIELD

Construction of the new turf soccer field with bleachers with shade canopy and restrooms is scheduled to begin in April 2023 and open in September 2023.

WHEREAS: Essex County College is requesting its full allocation of \$3,900,000 for the fiscal year 2023-2024 to commence on July 1, 2023; and

WHEREAS: The County is a funding partner and is required to share in 50% of the CRR cost approved by the State for the College and at this date, Chapter 12 capital funds are included in the Governor's budget; and

WHEREAS: The County is expected to appropriate a minimum amount of \$1,950,000 for the College's fiscal year 2023-2024 Chapter 12 request; and

WHEREAS: The College will use its fiscal year 2023-2024 Chapter 12 allocation to complete infrastructure projects as outlined in the College's redeveloped facilities master plan; and

WHEREAS: The College's Chapter 12 Capital Fund Budget request of a minimum allocation of \$3,900,000 will be submitted to the Board of School Estimate for approval at its next meeting; and

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Essex County College Board of Trustees as follows:

1. The Essex County College Board of Trustees hereby authorized the College's Chapter 12 Capital Funds request in a minimum amount of \$3,900,000 for the fiscal year 2023-2024 to commence on July 1, 2023.

STUDENTS FIRST: STRATEGIC PLAN VERSION 2.1 MIDTERM ACCOMPLISHMENTS

Goal I - Re-establish financial stability to ensure a sustainable future for Essex County College.

- The College has implemented a monthly reconciliation for PELL grants. The College is currently working to expand the same reconciliation process to other federal, state, and local grants.
- ECC has implemented a new and enhanced internal grant authorization form.
- Academic Affairs has taken the lead on coordinating and conducting the College's Perkins Comprehensive Local Needs Assessment (CLNA), a requirement for funding.
- ECC has engaged with the Alumni Association in several projects to include: a recruitment table at this year's graduation, Thanksgiving holiday food drive and an Angel Tree project during the Christmas season. Via the "Alumni Live" software, ECC has identified the email addresses of over 4,000 alumni so far, this year. Correspondence with alumni includes newsletters, a TV series, and press releases sent to the Alumni contact list.
- To improve succession planning, the administration has initiated several strategies designed to recognize and develop talent to secure the future success of the College. Research was conducted by Human Resources and this information was used to develop a presentation, which was facilitated with Cabinet Members in August 2022 and on August 24, 2022.
- Human Resources has reviewed job descriptions and the organizational chart to create career ladders.

Goal II - Maximize the impact of our academic programs and non-credit workforce development on the local community and labor market by increasing the number of students served.

- ECC's Dual Enrollment program has recently partnered with Montclair School District for addition in the Spring of 2023.
- Development of new marketing strategies targeting the western portion of the County, to promote the upcoming opening of the West Essex Campus, including a stakeholders meeting, student open-houses, marketing brochures, flyers, and targeted mailings.
- Developed new events at ECC's FOCUS and West Essex Technical High School sites featuring on-site registration and financial aid information sessions.
- QLESS has been fully implemented in the Welcome Center and Financial Aid Office. The College is currently working on the integration of Registrar and Advising into the Enrollment Management QLESS system.

• The College has developed an Equity, Diversity, Inclusion, and Belonging (EDIB) Plan for FY 2023 with initiatives to support LGBTQIA+ students and staff, students with disabilities, Hispanic/Latinx students, college-wide trainings, to better foster a climate of belonging.

Goal III - Continue to innovate our academic and student support programs to improve student persistence and on-time completion.

- The Progressive Retention Initiative has been implemented across the college. The mentor advisors stationed in every academic division have assisted well over 1375 students as of Spring 2022 and have guided the students with their course planning and scheduling by major. The advisors/mentors have specific outreach activities for all students during the semester including outreach to update Student Contact information and offer general assistance.
- The College fully implemented a new First-Year Experience course to improve student acclimation and increase retention. Over 52 sections have been offered so far, this academic year.
- The College has expanded the College's capacity to offer multiple learning modalities to best accommodate all learners. A new online course development process is established and to date Humanities has brought 6 new courses online, METCS is developing 9 online courses, Social Science has developed four of 8 new courses and can now offer a fully online Sociology degree.
- The College continues to evaluate the efficacy of the newly designed accelerated developmental English courses. In fall of 2022, of the 1000 students registered for ENG 099/ENG 101 corequisite model, 59% passed resulting in an impressive progression rate of 64%, which is over 10% higher than the prerequisite model last offered in spring 2020. Corequisite model mathematics course MTH 091S + MTH 101 and MTH 093S + MTH 103 are still being piloted.
- The College has implemented a comprehensive classroom technology and management training program to support faculty. This past fall, 22 of the 26 active participants in the ACUE training program completed their training and will be awarded a "Certificate in Effective Instruction" which is awarded jointly by ACUE (Association of College and University Educators) and ACE (American Council on Education), equivalent to three (3) graduate level credits.
- Several new articulation agreements including NJIT Joint Admission, MSU Program for Parents, and Pillar College were implemented in the past year. Discussions to initiate additional program-to-program agreements are in progress with Rutgers University, Felician University and NJIT.
- The College has completed the development of the Academic Master Plan. The 2022 2025 Academic Master Plan (AMP) is the result from an iterative, college-wide reflection that occurred because of a strong partnership between Academic Affairs, the academic governance committees, Community and Continuing Education & Workforce Development (CCE & WD) and the college-wide community. The plan reflects a longitudinal consensus regarding the College's strengths and opportunities.

- The College assessed campus wide SafeColleges training practices and restructured the way trainings are
 assigned to improve compliance with mandated trainings. As a result, the College has developed a process
 for monitoring compliance with trainings and coordinated with Area Heads to increase staff participation
 in trainings.
- On September 1, 2022, ECC launched the Office of Student Care Services (OSCS) to connect Essex County College students with the resources that they need to overcome barriers that affect their ability to be successful at Essex. The goal of this office is to provide students with a centralized location to receive basic needs resources (Health Care, Mental Health Counseling Services, Child Care, Transport, Food Pantry, SNAP benefits).
- Three in-person/virtual student orientations for new students and a newly designed "Second Year" student orientation was conducted to provide students with guidance on webservices registration, using the college catalog, using curriculum guides to monitor their academic progress, identifying their academic advisor, finding available mental health counseling services, and how to conduct a degree audit. In addition, posters were place throughout college with QR codes that link to student to tutorial videos on how to use Moodle and Webservices.
- During the Spring 2022 semester a Resource Day program was conducted to assist students with transferring to four-year universities. Participating universities were Rutgers, Montclair, Stockholm, Grand Canyon, and Kean. In addition, individual transfer counseling was provided for students. Lastly, during the 2022 Graduation Rehearsal 333 graduate reported enrollment into four-year universities.
- During the Fall 2022 semester, a new Assistant Director of Career and Transfer Services was hired to
 evaluate current advisement processes and develop new processes to enhance transfer processes from ECC
 to four-year institutions.
- The College participated in the MAPS grant which provides mentoring to students and trains faculty mentors to gain knowledge about institutional processes to best disseminate information via their classroom. Currently 6 faculty mentors are engaged in these activities including the contacting of dual enrollment students.
- FOCUS was reopened this Fall 2022 and faculty and staff are available at the Center in the evening hours to both teach as well as support with advisement, testing, financial aid, and tutoring. Additionally, a new computer lab was established to also allow students to use the computers for hybrid courses as well as tutoring and other webservices support.

Goal IV - Continue to improve the physical infrastructure of Essex County College to better meet the needs of our students and enhance the student learning experience.

- The following items have been accomplished in the main construction of the West Essex Campus:
 - Building exterior and roof are built and closed
 - Insulation is complete and interior wall closures are 70% done
 - Tile work is taking place

- Mechanical, electrical, and plumbing (MEP) work are complete and inspected
- Fire Protection (FP) work is complete and inspected
- Restrooms are inspected
- HVAC units are undergoing installation
- Retaining wall around the building is complete
- Top driveway and roundabout are blacktopped
- The BOT approved the interior furniture proposals
- The following items have been accomplished in the main construction of the West Essex Campus parking lot construction:
 - Proper footing construction is complete
 - Underground pipe installation is complete
 - Land leveling and grading is complete
 - Retaining wall on the retail complex side is complete
 - Precast panels and crane sections were delivered and are stored in the Caldwell Airport grounds
 - Precast panels installation began on 1/3/23
- The following items have been accomplished in the main construction of the West Essex Campus parking lot construction:
 - The architect shared the project packet with the College on 9/15/2022
- Additional capital planning accomplishments include:
 - Proposals for the renovation of the English Lab have been acquired and have been submitted for re view
 - An architect has been hired to plan the renovation of the library, 3rd floor, and the bidding documents are in progress.
 - LED Lighting fixtures Retrofit project is under implementation. Phase I Classrooms, Science Labs, Computer labs, Lecture Halls and Some Offices, was completed on June 1, 2022, and included the bookstore lights. A total of 3,997 fixtures were replaced and the installation contractor RMC Energy Brokers, provides immediate response to troubleshooting.

Two Essex County College Students Named to All-Academic Team

Elizabeth Bakare and **Favour Ogbinaka** are Essex County College's 2023 representatives on the All USA -New Jersey Community College Academic Team. The high achieving students are also in the running for the All USA National Academic Team.

"I was surprised and real grateful for this honor," said Elizabeth, a Biology, Pre-Medicine major from Newark. She said she had applied for the Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) Honor Society scholarship, which led to her selection. She is Vice President of Scholarship for the College's Alpha Theta Chapter of PTK. Elizabeth has a 3.89 grade point average.

"I was just hoping to receive a scholarship," recalled Favour, an Engineering major from Newark. "I filled out the application and just hoped things would work out, which they have," he added. Favour, who has a perfect 4.0 grade point average, serves as PTK Chapter Secretary.

"Both Elizabeth and Favour are exceptional students and student leaders. I could not be prouder of Elizabeth and Favour for their contribution to the team and to the student body, and I am excited to see what the future holds for them," said Professor Lynn Wilson, co-advisor of the ECC PTK chapter.

"Congratulations to Favour and Elizabeth. We are proud of them. And thank you to our PTK advisors," said ECC's President, Dr. Augustine A. Boakye.

"Most times, I look at myself and think a small girl from a little city is having big dreams," said Elizabeth, whose career goal is to become a medical doctor. She lists Cornell University and Rutgers University-New Brunswick as her top two transfer destinations after graduating from ECC.

In addition to his work in Phi Theta Kappa, Favour helped revitalize the College's Engineering Club. He plans to major in Computer Engineering after graduating from ECC, and is considering NJIT and Columbia University as transfer options.

They will represent Essex County College in Trenton (formally called PTK Day) in May of 2023, where they will be recognized alongside other New Jersey community college nominees by State officials.







Essex County College Joins Medical School Pathway Partnership

Essex County College has entered into a partnership with Caldwell University and St. George's University (SGU) designed to enable ECC students a pathway for admission into SGU's School of Medicine. The program is dubbed the 2+1+4 Partnership.

The partnership allows ECC students who earn an Associate degree in Biology, Pe-Medicine to transfer to Caldwell University for one year. They can then move on to St. George's University's School of Medicine, in Grenada, to pursue a four-year medical degree. They'll also have the opportunity to spend their first year of medicine at Northumbria University in the United Kingdom, which maintains a partnership with St. George's University.

"We're extremely excited about this new partnership," said Dr. Augustine A. Boakye, President of Essex County College. "We're pleased to be able to help our students who aspire to careers in medicine make their dreams a reality at St. George's University. Essex County College's curriculum will help ensure students receive a solid foundation as they continue on the path toward becoming medical doctors." "By including Caldwell University in our new partnership with St. George's University, our students will be even more prepared for the rigors of medical school. The third year at Caldwell University will provide students with the extra confidence to succeed at St. George's University School of Medicine," said Dr. Alvin Williams, Executive Dean of Faculty and Academics at Essex County College.

"We are thrilled to establish the first-ever 2+1+4 partnership for high-achieving students at Essex County College and Caldwell University," said Dr. G. Richard Olds, President of St. George's University. "The COVID-19 pandemic has revealed the depth of the U.S. doctor shortage. Partnerships like this one will help close that gap by making the path to medicine more accessible for aspiring physicians," he stated.

In order to remain eligible for the program, students must maintain a 3.4 grade point average while enrolled at Essex County College and at Caldwell. They must also register a competitive score on the MCAT.

Students accepted into the 2+1+4 program will receive a \$10,000 scholarship upon matriculating at St. George's University. They will receive their Bachelor of Science degree from Caldwell upon successfully completing the first year of the SGU's MD program.

"Caldwell University is thrilled to partner with St. George's University and Essex County College to offer students the opportunity to pursue medicine with exposure to medical professionals from around the world. This collaboration will provide our high achieving students the chance to earn both undergraduate and medical degrees through a global lens," said Caldwell University's President, Dr. Matthew Whelan.

NASA Program Takes Students to New Heights

For one week in August, the College's 4th Floor MPR turned into a beehive of activity as future scientists worked to build the perfect Martian rover out of Legos that could successfully traverse an alien landscape. That was the main theme of the Northeast Region - NASA Community College Aero space Scholars program ECC hosted.

But there was also teamwork and respect to be gained for the 26 students representing ECC and visiting Union County College and Norwalk (Connecticut) Community College.

"A program like this broadens my horizons. It's giving me the opportunity to build up my skills. I would definitely consider working for NASA someday," said Biology major Anthony Williams, of Newark.

The students were divided into four fictitious aerospace companies, with no more than three from one college. Their mission was to win the next rover contract by engineering a successful unit that performs well, learning the engineering design process, and managing the company budget.

The highlight of the week was running the motorized Lego rovers over the "Martian" surface to successfully retrieve various items, including one "lost" astronaut.

"Everything went extremely well. I know everyone really enjoyed themselves," said Dr. Nidhal Marashi, ECC Chemistry professor who co-chairs the College's NASA efforts with Physics Professor Dr. Nadia Lvov. Dr. Marashi said all participants can apply for NASA internships. Since 2018, ECC has been involved with the hands-on NASA program and several students have secured the internships. The College is one of only six community colleges nation-wide that piloted the NASA program.

"I've certainly learned a lot here," said Math major Rodrigo Fernandez. The Newark resident said he is happy he took a shot at participating. He plans to transfer to either NJIT or Rutgers University-New Brunswick and major in Physics.

"This is a special program and I'm happy we are hosting it. All of you have our full support," ECC President Dr. Augustine A. Boakye told the students. He applauded the efforts of Drs. Marashi, Lvov, and Biology, Chemistry and Physics Division Chair Dr. Eunice Kamunge for their work in holding the Northeast Region program at ECC.

State Sen. Majority Leader M. Teresa Ruiz said, "You are all winners. You are developing skill sets that will prepare you for successful careers going forward."

Rodrigo Fernandez, Asmaa Bouknadel and Karim Eldaoush were the three ECC students on the winning Navy Blue Team. Other ECC NASA participants were Homero Palaguachi, Michele Previlon and Anthony Williams (Red Team); Isabella Pedrosa, Cervante Hamilton and Zachary Miller (Gold Team), and Bilal Muhammad and Cordell Litus (Green Team).

ECC Gym Dedicated in Honor of Legendary Coach Cleo Hill, Sr.

Since opening in 1985, the Essex County College Gymnasium had simply been known as the Physical Education Building. A change occurred on May 27, 2022, when the newly renovated Gym was formally dedicated as the **Cleo Hill, Sr.** Physical Education Building, complete with exterior signage. Additionally, the **Cleo Hill, Sr.** name is emblazoned on the new Gym floor.

Cleo Hill, Sr. was an NBA standout and legendary ECC Men's Basketball Coach and Athletic Director. Born and raised in Newark, he was a graduate of South Side (now Malcom X Shabazz) High School and Winston-Salem Teachers College (now University). In 1961, he was the top draft choice of the St. Louis Hawks, the fifth player ever drafted from an Historically Black College and University.

Unfortunately, he was "blackballed" from the NBA following his rookie year. He subsequently played in the American Basketball League and the Continental Basketball League before coming to ECC as head coach.

At ECC, Coach Hill compiled an amazing 489-128 record over 24 years, including a trip to the National Junior College Athletic Association championship game.

"We loved you Cleo Hill and hope we've done well by your family today," said **Marion A. Bolden**, Chair of the College's Board of Trustees during the dedication ceremony. College Trustee **Johanna Wright** added Coach Hill had great courage. "Courage is something you can't buy; it's the willingness to stand for right, even if you stand alone. That is who we honor today."

Fighting back tears, an emotional Cleo Hill, Jr. said, "Our family is forever grateful to Essex County College, Newark and Essex County for this honor. My father was passionate about winning, the fundamentals of basketball and, most importantly, the grooming of young men."

Before the formal cutting of the green ribbon in front of the Cleo Hill, Sr. Physical Education Building, former ECC basketball players offered testimonies to their coach.

"Coach Hill was the first person to teach me about life. He mentored me and got me on the start to where I am today," said Essex County Commissioner and former ECC basketball player **Rufus Johnson**.

"I couldn't wait to get here today and show my appreciation to Coach Hill. Coach first saw me when I was a kid playing basket-ball at the rec center. He taught me so much," said Louis Grimsley. Grimsley was the longtime basketball coach at Shabazz High School and served as an assistant coach at Elizabeth City (North Carolina) State University.

Former ECC players **Russell Shuler** and **Kim Fisher** also offered testimonies. "It's difficult to find the words for what Coach Hill meant to me. He was like a second father," said Shuler.

"Cleo Hill, Sr. dedicated his life to Essex County College. We will never forget what he did for us," said ECC's President, **Dr. Augustine A. Boakye**. Dr. Boakye also thanked Essex County Executive **Joseph N. DiVincenzo**, **Jr.** for the role he played in renovating the interior of the Gym, including the floors, hallway and lighting.

His legacy at the College might be as impressive as his playing ability" He added that an ECC Athletic Hall of Fame is also planned for the Gym.
